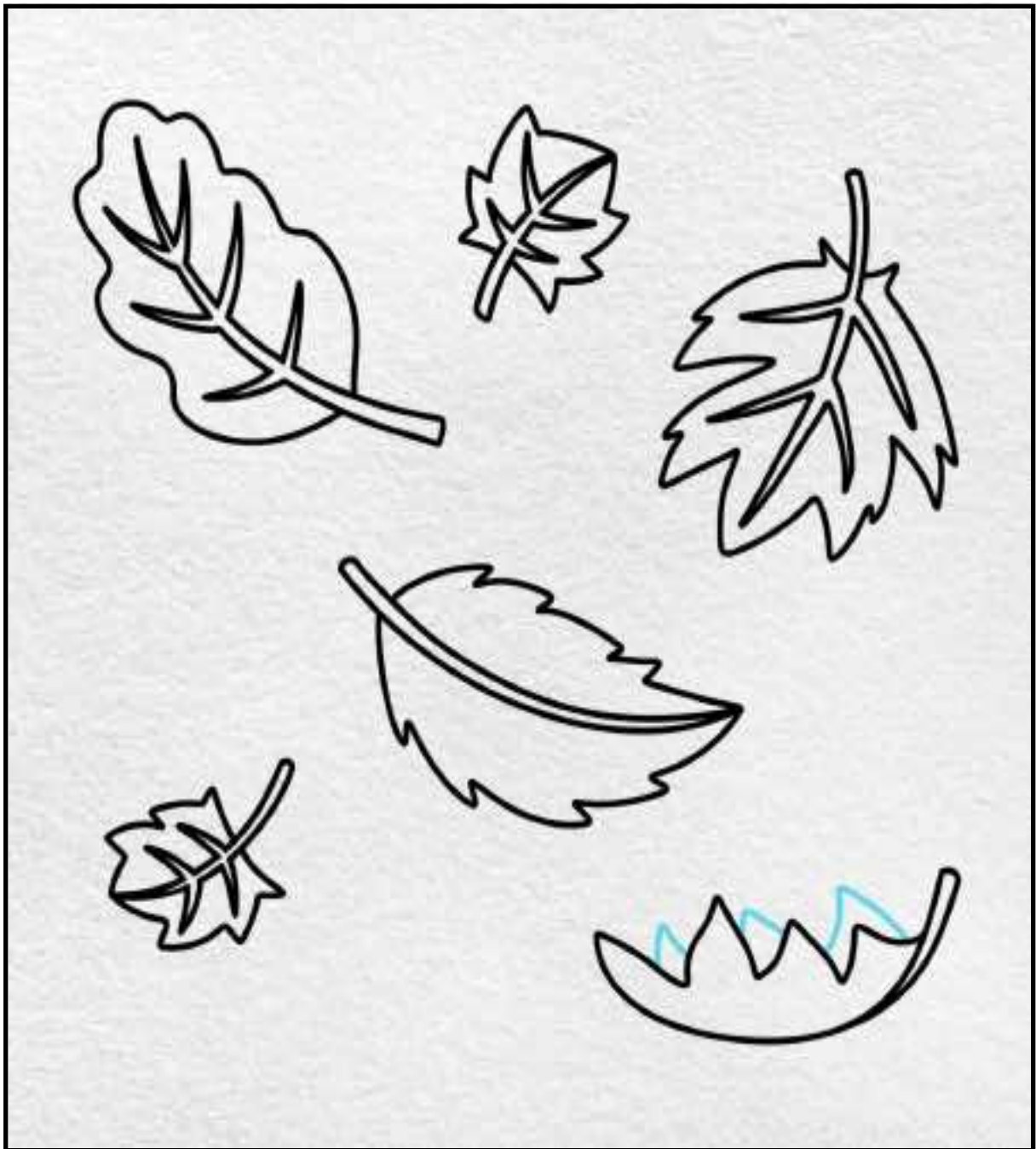

Going back

Dear friends,

On 6th September we went back to St Mark's, Gabalfa, in Cardiff, for their 150th anniversary. It was my curacy church. Thirteen years ago we left there for my first role as vicar, in Bargoed, with our two children and all our worldly possessions loaded into two lorries.

It was good to catch up with old friends, and to meet some new faces too. A few things were different, and the church hall had a new roof. A new vicar leads the church, with his own way of doing things.

There was some deep sadness. On the Sunday morning we learned that some we had loved there had passed on to glory. We had not known until we asked after them, and the asking became its own small grief. There was joy as well. Young people we remembered as children are now serving God all over the country and making a difference with their lives. There are new additions to families, and to the church. The place we once knew had changed, and mostly for the better.

The church has grown, and we have grown too. When we left, our children were four and two. Our daughter is deep in her A-Levels, our Son has started GCSEs and his feet are now bigger than mine. Thirteen years is a strange thing to measure in school reports and shoe sizes, but standing in a church I used to know so well, that was what stood out.

The Welsh have a word for what I felt walking back into that building: *hiraeth*, a longing for a home that may no longer exist, or perhaps never quite existed as we remember it. *Hiraeth* belongs here. It is what love feels like when it meets time. It points us towards the truth that we are never quite at home in this world. C.S. Lewis put it better than I can:

"If we find ourselves with a desire that nothing in this world can satisfy, the most probable explanation is that we were made for another world."

When we find that the home we return to has moved on without us, I think the answer is to bless it, and walk on.

This is what pilgrimage teaches. A pilgrim walks towards something, trusting that the journey itself will change them. The place they left keeps moving too, growing its own new chapters without waiting for their return. Abraham walked out from Ur not knowing where he was going. The two disciples on the road to Emmaus recognised Jesus only once they had walked some distance with him. Faith, I think, is closer to that walking than to any fixed position on a hill. It is chosen again each day, on ordinary roads, with people we love beside us.

We are on a journey here in the West Hereford Team. Seeking together to become more like Jesus for the sake of others. We do not know exactly where that will lead us. That is exciting, and a little frightening too. But we do know that we will be changed on the way, and we know the one who walks with us on the road.

October seems a fitting month for dwelling on this. The nights are drawing in, and the year is turning its own kind of road, from harvest towards Advent. It might be worth asking what stretch of the road we are on, and who is walking it with us.

St Mark's Gabalfa has grown since we followed God's onward call, and its people have grown too, in ways I could never have imagined. I hope the same will be true of our Team here as we walk the journey of the next years, seeking to become more like Jesus, so that whoever meets us on the road finds something good.

Anniversary - I wonder how many of you look up dates to see what happened on them? If you love history you already know that 87 years ago the Britain declared war on Nazi Germany for invading Poland. The Second World War ended in 1945 and peace was maintained in Europe despite the Cold War until Russia invaded Ukraine.

In many ways anniversary dates often remind us of significant events in history or things closer to home like weddings or birthdays and I think we find these easier to mark because we are involved and invested in them. In churches we have festivals which help remind ourselves of the Christian story. From a spiritual perspective, if you were to look for them there is almost a Saints day for every day of the year! We are about to enter a season of Harvest Festivals, All Souls tide and Remembrance Sunday, as human being we love to find reasons to celebrate anniversaries and significant dates.

“One person esteems one day as better than another, while another esteems all days alike. Each one should be fully convinced in his own mind. The one who observes the day, observes it in honour of the Lord. The one who eats, eats in honour of the Lord, since he gives thanks to God, while the one who abstains, abstains in honour of the Lord and gives thanks to God.”
Romans 14:5-6

Paul writing to the church in Rome says to them that how we mark anniversaries or which anniversaries doesn't actually matter in God's kingdom but it is the attitude of the heart that matters. Paul didn't condemn the people for marking days or celebrating special anniversaries instead he reminds them that we need to honour God in all that we do.

“I hate, I despise your religious festivals; your assemblies are a stench to me. Even though you bring me burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them. Though you bring choice fellowship offerings, I will have no regard for them. Away with the noise of your songs! I will not listen to the music of your harps. But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!”
Amos 5:21-24

In the book of Amos God tells the people through the prophet that he has no time for their religious feasts, festivals and anniversaries because of their attitude towards others. The religious people have forgotten that their faith in God starts and finishes with justice, righteousness and mercy. If we do not allow God to change our hearts and minds then our religious festivals and ceremonies are meaningless. It is the very thing that Jesus condemns the religious people of his time for doing and what Paul warns Timothy against.

“People will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boastful, proud, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, without love, unforgiving, slanderous, without self-control, brutal, not lovers of the good, treacherous, rash, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God— having a form of godliness but denying its power. Have nothing to do with such people.”
2 Timothy 3:2-5

Our faith is primarily lived out everyday and whilst festivals and anniversaries help us remember the faith story when they become more important than our faith we are in danger of swapping human rules and regulations for spiritual realities.

It's hello from me! I'm Fr Paul, and I'm delighted to be joining the West Hereford Team as Team Vicar.

My route into ordained ministry has been a somewhat winding, before becoming a priest I worked in local government planning and served as an Army Reservist. Both have left their mark. Planning taught me to look carefully at places, communities and the way they change (and that absolutely everyone has an opinion about planning). The Territorial Army (as it then was) taught me about service, teamwork, resilience and never to trust an officer with a map! I have always been drawn to boundaries – the places where one thing meets another. Perhaps this is because of my family connection with the Welsh Marches. I think it certainly explains both my career choices and my love of pilgrimage. There is something wonderfully liberating about setting off on a long walk with a rucksack, a map and the comforting knowledge that, sooner or later, you will probably work out where you are. (I'd be very happy to bore to you along the way tales of my 1,000 km walk from Calais to Switzerland following the Via Francigena!)

But boundaries are more than lines on a map. They can be places of encounter: where church meets community, faith meets doubt, the familiar meets the new, and our carefully arranged plans meet the wonderfully untidy purposes of God. I have come to believe that this is often where the Good News of Jesus Christ is to be found – among people and places that sit between things, rather than comfortably inside them.

That is why All Saints feels such an exciting place to be. Placed right in the heart of Hereford, with a café bustling inside the church and shops, businesses, the theatre, football and the many different lives of the city immediately around us. It is a wonderful boundary place – somewhere the life of the Church and the life of the city can meet.

I'm passionate about music and pilgrimage, and perhaps most of all about bringing people together. I hope to help create a church where people can discover the grace of God in the midst of ordinary life, and become more aware of the power and presence of the Holy Spirit already at work in them.

I'm looking forward to getting to know you, sharing the journey, and, along with Jonathan and the rest of the team, discovering where God is leading us next. I promise to bring a map. Though I am now an Army Cadet Force officer in my spare time, so whether I can read it correctly remains, of course, a matter for prayer.

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Hereford Food Bank Harvest 2026

In October this year all three parishes will be supporting Food Bank during their Harvest Festival services. The generosity last year made a huge difference to local families, and as we prepare for what looks to be an even busier winter, your help is more important than ever.

During 2025 people donated the equivalent of £92,000 of food and essential items which helped us support over 5,000 people. The ongoing support is amazing and really appreciated. Between January and June this year alone, Hereford Foodbank has provided 7 day emergency food parcels for **2,376 people – including 801 children**. Rising food costs are having a big impact on our work, for example, the cost of a basic packet of mince has gone up by £1.20 since January, so every donation really does matter.

The most common referring agencies continue to be housing associations, adult social services, young people & children services, and local welfare providers. The top three reasons for referral are low income/delayed wages, benefit issues, and health/disability related matters. Our community navigator has facilitated 175 families (January- June) to obtain additional support so that they can address the underlying causes of their food shortage/emergency.

Bank the Food is an app that people may wish to download onto their phone and as they go into a participating supermarket, it shows them what the local food bank needs. We are using it and now have 500 followers!

During the year members of our churches have supported the Food Bank by leaving items in the basket in church, depositing food items in the supermarket collection points, or giving financially via standing order. If you feel able to contribute to this year's Harvest Festival your offering would be gratefully received.

Could This Be You?

Holy Trinity needs three people to step into key roles as soon as possible: a Church Warden, a Treasurer, and a PCC Secretary. Each one keeps the church running in a different way, and each one matters.

Church Warden – Wardens are the practical backbone of a parish. The role covers looking after the building and its upkeep, supporting the vicar, and acting as a point of contact for the congregation and the wider community. It suits someone organised, approachable, and willing to get their hands dirty when something needs fixing or arranging.

Treasurer—The Treasurer oversees the church's finances and reports to the PCC, working alongside our bookkeeper, who handles the day-to-day accounts. You don't need to be an accountant. What matters is a head for figures, sound judgement, and a willingness to keep an eye on the bigger financial picture. Holy Trinity uses Data Developments for its accounts, and training and support are available.

PCC Secretary –The Secretary keeps the Parochial Church Council running smoothly: arranging meetings, taking minutes, and making sure decisions are recorded and followed through. It's a role for someone well organised, a clear writer, and comfortable keeping people on track.

None of these roles requires special qualifications. What they need is someone willing to give time and care to a job that keeps the church functioning for everyone else.

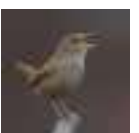

A SERIES ON THE PSALMS
Ancient Songs From A King

The psalms are among the oldest prayers still in use today. People have been praying these words for three thousand years. Shepherds prayed them. So did kings. Jesus prayed them too, in the synagogue, at festivals, on the cross. Monks in their cells, martyrs facing death, people waiting out a long exile: all of them turned to these same words.

The psalms don't tidy up what it means to be human. A psalm can hold grief and praise in the same breath, doubt next to trust, silence that goes on too long before the song finally breaks through.

Over the next ten months we'll take one psalm at a time and dwell on it long enough to let it work on us. This isn't a Bible study or a commentary. It's a conversation with an old prayer, asking what it might have to say to us now.

Psalm 131 | A Quieted Soul

My heart is not lifted up, my eyes are not raised too high; I do not occupy myself with things too great and too marvellous for me.

Psalm 131 is one of the shortest psalms in the Bible, three verses, you can read it in about the length of time it takes to boil a kettle. Generations of Christians have returned to it across a lifetime of prayer.

The psalmist has stopped reaching for things beyond their grasp: great matters, marvellous things, questions too large to answer. There is relief in it rather than resignation, the same relief you feel when you finally put down something heavy you've been carrying too far.

Then comes the image the psalm is known for:

I have calmed and quieted my soul, like a weaned child with its mother.

A weaned child is no longer crying to be fed. It has settled, close to its mother, wanting nothing more than to be there, to be held.

There is something wonderfully ordinary about the picture. A child has found somewhere safe to be, and for a while there is nothing else to achieve.

Perhaps prayer can be like that. There are times when we come with questions, fears and things we desperately want God to change. Psalm 131 gives us another picture: simply staying close to God, allowing the soul to become quiet.

The psalm doesn't end with the child. Its final line turns outward:

O Israel, hope in the Lord, from this time forth and for evermore.

What the psalmist has discovered in the quiet of their own soul becomes a word of hope for the whole people of God.

Perhaps that is the invitation of this ancient song: to find a little space to be at rest, and to discover that we can carry something of that rest with us into the lives of others.

Questions for reflection

Where are you carrying things too great for you?

What would it take, even for five minutes a day, to put them down and become still?



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October Saint of the Month: Paulinus

Paulinus was born in Italy in the sixth century. How come we saw him recently in Northumberland? Because we visited Ad Gefrin which had a splendid film showing him with King Edwin at his palace at Yeavering (speaking with an Italian accent). He had gone there with Edwin's Christian bride Ethelburga, after coming to England with St Augustine. In 627 Paulinus dedicated the first church at York and became its bishop, following the original plan to have an archbishopric there as well as in the south. When Edwin was killed by Penda of Mercia, Paulinus had to move to Rochester and died there in 644. While in the north he baptised many people and at least some were given a commemorative gold coin! I wonder what effect that would have now?

*God our Saviour,
who sent Paulinus to preach and to baptize,
and so to build up your Church in this land:
grant that, inspired by his example,
we may tell all the world of your truth,
that with him we may receive the reward
you prepare for all your faithful servants;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.*



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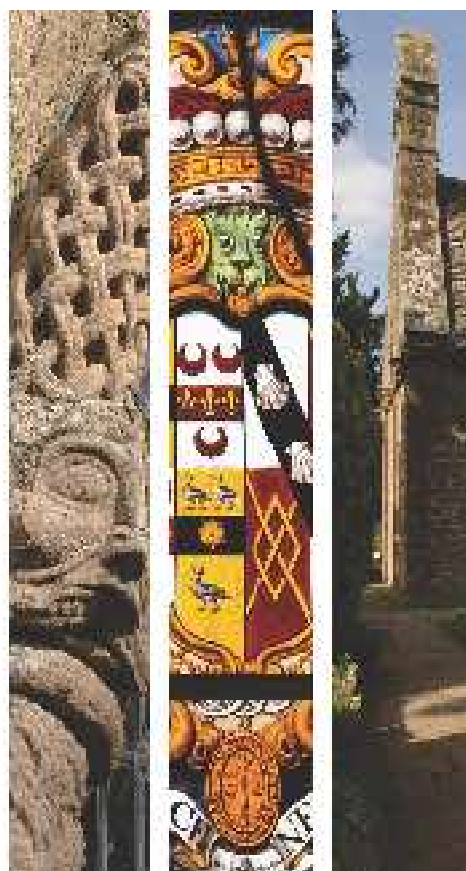
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Down Memory Lane – Frank Woods Vicar of All Saints

1877- 86

I was asked by Chris Barnet who was a resident in Christchurch, New Zealand whether Frank Woods who was Vicar of All Saints 1877- 86 and founder of Holy Trinity Church in the 1880's, was the Woods who eventually became Bishop of Lichfield and had a son who became Archdeacon of Christchurch New Zealand. Chris had known his son, Samuel in New Zealand and could remember his amazing voice which could be heard very well in the nave when he took the service in the chancel!

Well, the answer is unfortunately, no! Frank Woods did not become Bishop of Lichfield.

However, our Frank Woods is a descendant of a Woods family which is listed in Burke's Family Records. He was the second son of Edward Woods, a civil engineer born in 1814, who became President of the Institution of Civil Engineers 1886/7. Frank was born in 1845, went to Cambridge, and became Vicar of All Saints here in Hereford, before going to be Vicar of St. Andrew's Nottingham.



. He married Alice Octavia, third daughter of Joseph Fry, of Fairkytes, Hornchurch, Essex and granddaughter of Mrs Elizabeth Fry, the prison reformer and they had four children born in Hereford. Frank and Alice are in a photo (pictured above) taken when he was vicar of All Saints in 1910.

We now come to an interesting piece of information: Frank and Alice's third child was Edward Sydney Woods 1877-1953 who was born in the Vicarage, 37 Widemarsh Street, Hereford when his father Frank was Vicar of All Saints. It was Edward who later became Bishop of Lichfield 1937-53.

And Chris Barnet was right in that there is a connection with Christchurch New Zealand because Edward and his wife, Clemence had five children one of whom was Samuel Edward Woods who was an archdeacon in New Zealand. I also found out that Samuel's siblings all seem to have made a name for themselves – one of his sisters was the photographer Janet Clemence Woods, his brother Frank Woods, was Archbishop of Melbourne, Australia and another brother Robert (Robin) Wilmer Woods, was Bishop of Worcester.

This family has so many people I could write about! I shall start with Elizabeth Fry! I suppose we have all heard of Elizabeth Fry, she was the subject of many school assemblies. In 1814 after visiting men and women prisoners in Newgate prison she set out to improve the experience of women in prisons. As a Quaker she had a strong belief in peace, justice and the equality of all people and this led her to give women prisoners religious and moral guidance to help them avoid crime when at the time cruel punishment was the accepted way of treating wrongdoing. She found that women responded to her teaching and this led her to help pass key reforms of improving conditions in prisons, segregating men and women, and having women warders. Women prisoners were *"encouraged to sew and knit, skills which would be useful outside prison. They were also allowed to sell the items they made to make money."* (londonmuseum.org.uk) I wonder if some of Elizabeth Fry's beliefs were passed down her descendants, through her granddaughter Alice to Alice's grandchildren?

I found an obituary for Alice Octavia Woods, Elizabeth Fry's granddaughter in 1923, *"Mrs Woods shared to the full her husband's devoted work and they were greatly beloved by all... Mrs Woods inherited to a large extent the looks and the magnetic personality of her grandmother, Mrs Elizabeth Fry. To know her was to love her, and her dignity, generosity, humour, her Christian life, and her sympathy with her neighbours will never be forgotten by those who had the privilege of coming within her influence. She followed closely all church work both at home and abroad, and to that end the Mothers' Union, for which she so frequently spoke, was a special interest to her... she inherited from her Quaker ancestors a quietness of spirit and a buoyancy of disposition which were no small part of her attraction. She believed in God and she believed in people, and this faith gave her true optimism which was the delight – and sometimes the amusement – of those who loved her... From her grandmother, we should imagine, she received a power of homely and winsome speech which went straight to the hearts of all that listened. She just stood up and talked, as mother to mother, as woman to woman, in a way which was often enough indescribably moving."* I think it must have been difficult for her as a child and perhaps even as an adult in always having her grandmothers example held up before her as someone to aspire to. However, in this obituary, her personality shines through the expectations of others.

And now for another woman who led a more bohemian lifestyle. Janet Clemence Woods 1912-1988, one of the Bishop of Lichfield's daughters, Alice's granddaughter and sister of Samuel Edward Woods (who went to New Zealand). Janet went to the Royal College of Music and had a singing career ahead of her but married Reynolds

Reynolds Stone the engraver and typographer in 1938. She was for three months at the beginning of her marriage training to be an opera singer under Miele, who gave her free lessons as he believed her to be better equipped to sing Verdi than anyone else! However, she decided to leave opera singing and devote her time to supporting her husband and her household at Litten Cheney, Dorset and she became a well-known hostess during their 40 years together. She enjoyed entertaining and many clever, artistic and talented people came to an environment where they could work and relax and who in some cases were able to collaborate with Reynolds in creating illustrations for their work and this she did on a modest income and with one helper in the kitchen. Many young people were also invited to stay and they found themselves enriched by the paradise she created. After Reynolds died in 1979 she gave up the house and entertaining on such a scale as life for her at Litton Cheney without her husband had become lonely.

Her friend Iris Murdoch encouraged her to publish "Thinking Faces" in 1988 which was a collection of her photographs which showed her ability in capturing a person's character and emotion. She worked almost entirely in black and white and most of the best were done while she was at Litton Cheney. Wikipedia tells us that she *"had a thirty year affair with Kenneth Clark and he did not treat her well. She expected to marry him after his wife died but he married another. After Clark died in 1983 a box was found of letters written by Woods. They were unopened"*. However, the collaboration and connection with Kenneth Clark fostered a creative dialogue *'which enriched both their artistic pursuits'* (Arts Dot.com). After her death in 1998 a large collection of her photos was given to the National Portrait Gallery. The Bodleian Libraries published a collection of these portraits in 2018 *"Through the Lens of Janet Stone"* recording 26 years of portraits which she had taken.

Finally, what about Janet's brother Samuel Edward who went to New Zealand? Samuel Edward visited New Zealand in 1934-5 as he was a godson of Campbell West-Watson, Bishop of Christchurch. He returned to New Zealand in 1937 to become the first chaplain at Canterbury University College and Precentor of Christchurch Cathedral 1939-1941. At the beginning of the war, he came back to England to become Vicar of Ross from 1941/2, from where he became chaplain in the Royal New Zealand Air Force. He returned to England after the war but finally went back to New Zealand and became Archdeacon of Rangiora, and then Sumner and finally Akaroa until 1977, when he retired and later died in 2001. He was married to Sybil Williams in 1940 and they have one son, Christopher.

So, thanks to Chris Barnet, I have found that Frank the Vicar of All Saints and his wife Alice founded a dynasty with descendants who found themselves drawn to supporting others at the cost of their own comfortable lives.

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Learning to See by Revd Kina Robertshaw

Rector of the Highley with Billingsley, Glazeley, and Deuxhill and Chelmarsh Benefice

When I was asked to write something for Black History Month on the theme Honouring Our Communities, my first response was hesitation. I serve in a predominantly white rural community, in a diocese where ethnic diversity among clergy and congregations remains relatively limited. I wondered: what could I write that would be honest, rather than simply saying what might be expected of me?

Then I thought about two young men who arrived in Highley.

They were refugees from Ethiopia, both young adults, arriving in a rural village very different from the world they had known. One spoke very little English; the other had only enough to get by. They were strangers in a new country, trying to find their way in a community where almost everything around them was unfamiliar.

As a church leadership, we realised that this was not simply a situation happening in our community. It was an opportunity for us to ask what it means to be followers of Jesus within our community. So we returned to the words of Jesus in Matthew 25:

"I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in..."

We spent time as a congregation reflecting on these words. My encouragement to the church was simple: let us not miss the opportunity God has placed before us to show the love of Jesus.

And something began to happen.

I watched members of the congregation respond. People gave clothing and practical help. They offered friendship, welcome and kindness. Barriers of language, culture and background did not disappear, but they became less important as relationships began to form.

What struck me was that Scripture had helped us to see differently.

Perhaps that is where honour begins.

Honouring people is more than helping them. It is seeing them. It is recognising the God-given dignity of the person standing before us and refusing to define them simply by what they lack, where they have come from, or what they can contribute.

That matters far beyond our experience with these two young men.

In our churches, we rightly speak about encouraging people to serve and participate in ministry. But there is a difference between valuing people and valuing what people can do for us.

Before we ask someone to step up, volunteer, lead or give more, perhaps we first need to ask: Do they know that they are seen? Do they know that they are valued? Have we taken time to recognise what God has already placed within them?

For me, Honouring Our Communities invites us to look again at the people God has placed around us those who have served quietly for decades, those whose contributions are easily overlooked, and those who arrive among us as strangers.

Black History Month rightly invites us to remember and honour those whose stories and contributions have too often gone unseen. But perhaps it can also challenge us to ask: Who are we failing to see today?

Jesus said, *"Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."*

Perhaps he was not only teaching us how to serve.

Perhaps he was teaching us where to look for him

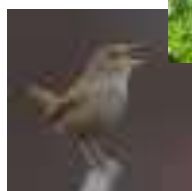
Breinton Parish Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) 2026 Program

On September 1st the Parish Council hosted an update of the plans to survey, monitor, protect and enhance local biodiversity, as part of the Herefordshire County Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS). The meeting was the third since the BAP working group was formed this year and for those who missed the first two here is a short summary of our progress.

The first meeting on 16th January was to inform the public of the LNRS mapping and the importance of our parish traditional orchards, ancient woodlands, complex hydrology with a natural migration corridor along the river Wye SAC SSSI. In this meeting we invited ecologist Will Watson to give an illustrated talk on the rich biodiversity of the parish, highlighting the importance of citizen science and potential to collate new biological records from important traditional orchards, ancient woodlands and spring fed ponds. The key stakeholders including many Parish and City residents, Cider Museum Trust, The National Trust, The Wildlife Trust and the key landholders i.e. Wyevale Nurseries and Manor Farm.

We outlined the findings of our research project to examine the main threats to biodiversity published in our pathfinder document. We focused on the potential impact of infrastructure and housing developments, changing climate and intense agricultural practise. The slides are available on the parish council website along with a detailed illustrated report called the Pathfinder BAP.

In January we defined our objectives and launched a working group to enable volunteers to take actions. Subsequently, the Parish Council contacted the Herefordshire Mammals Group to borrow bat detectors and sought costs estimates for a consultant specialist firm to conduct a hydrological survey of the parish with the aim of mapping the complex hydrology that supports our local biodiversity. In the second meeting of the BAP group on 2nd June we showed the National Emergency Briefing film to increase awareness of the looming impact of climate change. Following the film we had an open discussion of what actions were feasible on a local scale in the light of expected increased frequency of flooding and extreme heat due to climate change. Notes from this meeting are available on the parish council website.

In this meeting residents highlighted their particular concern on the impact of infrastructure and housing developments of local biodiversity. The proposed actions of the working group were discussed in terms an imminent hydrological survey to inform a program of work on ponds, an ecologist's report on a special moss carpet pond in the belt of traditional orchards, woodland surveys for rare plants and river bank surveys for bat species and numbers.

This public meeting was attended by several elected county councillors including Cllr Charlie Taylor and Cllr Elisa Swinglehurst, with county council officers from the environment department, who pledged to help fund citizen science surveys in the parish of Breinton. With the promise of financial support the working group drew plans to train citizen scientists to survey ponds and record bat colonies. This initial work programme of two citizen science projects was presented in a grant application to Herefordshire Council Nature and Biodiversity Grant Fund in August this year. We await news patiently as the season for bat surveys is expected to close by mid September

On September 1st the Parish Council hosted its third public meeting with an update of the plans to survey, monitor, protect and enhance local biodiversity, as part of the Herefordshire County Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS).

We presented key maps from the Breinton Parish hydrological survey, hot off the press, to illustrate the importance of the spring fed ponds either side of the Breinton ridge, (to be surveyed for amphibians in March 2027), and the importance of protection zones for a commercial aquifer in the north of our parish. A map displaying the proposed new road cut through the Breinton Ridge with springs and ponds either-side highlighted the threat to local biodiversity.

Flood prone sites will get worse according to the Environment Agency mapping

Perhaps more importantly, the survey highlighted the potential for increased flooding in the north east of the parish and the western edge of the city, from the proposed road cut through Breinton Ridge, over 600m long and 20m deep, as illustrated in the Local Transport Plan. The currently experienced local floods impact a large area outlined in the Core Strategy for more housing. On a more positive note, the EA climate change adjusted flood maps support potential for marshlands, wetlands and nature recovery along its wide river terraces to the south of the Parish, illustrated on the new LNRS maps.

Hydrology survey highlights the wettest place in the parish

With the threat of infrastructure and house building looming large to local wildlife, and the increased frequency of localised flooding, we used the case study of a proposed 45 house development in **Breinton Lee**, to illustrate the pitfalls. In this case, poor site selection for housing in an area experiencing increased flooding, proceeded without a full knowledge of the compounded run-off from springs and drainage conditions. Recently existing houses experienced increased flooding and the developers presented another flood risk assessment projecting reduced local flooding if new sustainable drainage is developed. The parish council reiterated their key objections. The meeting also gave residents an opportunity to express their concerns and seek additional support in representation.

Volunteers sought for the bat survey program

The hydrological update was followed by a succinct presentation by Cllr Chris Easter on citizen Science bat surveying which we highly recommend you review online via our council website. Firstly it informed us on the techniques and analysis of bat survey data and secondly the range of species and habitat to look out for when surveying, first with hand held smart-phone enabled devices and then with a static detector. The parish Council recently received a static and a mobile bat detector from the Herefordshire Mammals Group for use during the first week of September. We waited several months for this surveying opportunity, just as the bats begin to hibernate in mid September. In anticipation of demand from volunteers both in our Parish and adjoining parishes we applied for a grant to buy two mobile and one static detector to expedite our surveys across the parish next year. Fingers crossed that we are granted funds to locate and analyse these protected species as some of the rarest in the country inhabit the Wye Valley.

Volunteers sought for the pond survey program

The lively discussion on bat surveying was followed by an illustrated talk by guest speaker Will Watson, well known from his work on ice ponds, amphibian surveys and detailed bespoke surveys on the river Lugg as part of its restoration process. Will provided an overview of the methodology, key species to look out for and the location of the proposed citizen science training. He emphasised the importance of proceeding with caution as the handling and surveying for great crested newts is a licensed activity and needs to be professionally supervised. The plan is to start with the spring fed ponds on the river terrace of the Wye in March next year. The training should enable volunteers to start looking at the spring fed ponds throughout the area taking care not to disturb protected species without licensed supervision.

We hope you find the BAP meetings and information on the Parish website interesting and encourage you to attend future meetings, sign up to volunteer and begin using the I-Record app on your smart phones, to submit evidence of interesting local species in our parish. For updated notices on meetings sign up for the BAP working group by email, look at our BPC public notice boards, follow the Breinton Community Facebook page and keep a bookmark on the parish council website.

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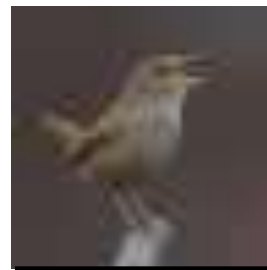




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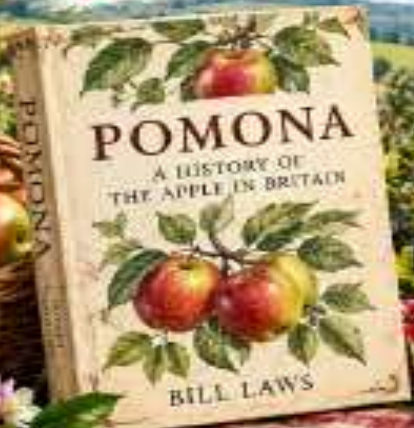

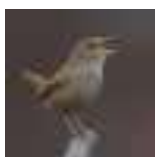
